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
Regional Director

As it is often said "Timing is everything!"

Having just returned from the Fall ADS Board Meeting, I have some very interesting items to share in this issue of the MoKanOk!

Our latest count of ADS members as of 9-20-2023 is 5014 members. We had done some "house cleaning" related to ADS Life Members. It came to our attention that some life members had moved and had not given their new mailing address. When we began a search for other life members, we found others that were deceased and were still on our membership roster. We had been sending journals to the nursing homes or other care facilities even after they had passed. We had not been notified by family members, local club members nor the agency where they were living when they passed away. We found a surprising number that we removed from the roster. That will save the organization a few dollars in printing



and mailing excess journals. We need all the clubs and members to inform the ADS when a member passes so we can keep our membership files current.

On the topic of membership, the Board of Directors approved a small increase in the cost of membership beginning January 1, 2024. The membership fees had not been adjusted in 12 years. In that time, postal costs have increased. Publishing costs have increased as well.

The fees for each membership category:

Individual one year from \$25 up to \$30; Dual one year from \$30 up to \$36;

3-year Individual from \$70 up to \$84; 3 year dual from \$83 up to \$99;

Youth membership from \$10 to \$12;

Life membership fee is still being discussed as to how much it will increase but it will increase as well.

Given this information, if your membership renewal is coming up near the end of 2023, you can avoid the small increase by renewing prior to it going into effect January first!

Speaking of membership and opportunities, we had THREE of our Region 11 clubs submit their membership roster and apply to be in the Club Membership Recognition Program this year! Yay for us with the Topeka Daylily Club, Flint Hills Daylily Society and Air Capital Daylily Society having entered! AND Congratulations to Air Capital for having 94% of their membership as ADS members. That qualified them to be in the drawing for \$500 cash to be spent however the winner chooses. Unfortunately, they did not win the drawing but perhaps they will be luckier next year! It would be great to have ALL or at least most of Region 11 clubs be in the contest! You can do it!

The 2026 ADS National Convention will be held in Valdosta Georgia! That should be another great event! That is about all I have to share for now.

Please get registered for the 2024 National Convention in Oklahoma City next year. If you have never attended an ADS National Convention, you need to attend the upcoming National in our own region being hosted by the Central Oklahoma Daylily Society in 2024. Summer Happenings and Spring Fling!

What a great summer we had, despite the heat! In place of a summer regional, I worked on my goal of visiting clubs and display gardens in Region 11. I first went to Topeka for their accredited AHS Daylily Show in June (really as a Junior Exhibition Judge - not a presidential visit). On the way to Topeka, I stopped at the Lenington-Long Garden in Kansas City and enjoyed viewing some of the classics that are still important in hybridizing today. On the way home, I visited the Topping Garden in Liberty, MO. Later in the summer, Leemer and I went to Manhattan, KS where the Flint Hills Daylily Club hosted a talk by Charles and Heidi Douglas.

A big congratulations and thank-you to volunteers in those clubs that maintain a Daylily Display Garden at a public Botanical Garden. I believe those gardens introduce many people to the beauty and variety of daylilies. It is inspiring to read the club reports about this kind of service to the greater community.

How important are daylilies really? As I listen to the reports of storms on the East Coast and tornados in our own region, I often wonder how the beautiful gardens in those areas survived. I think first, of course, about the great daylily people we have met over the years and feel the connection with them, forged by a love of daylilies.



The question of the importance of daylilies came up for me again at our daylily sale at our Farmer's market. A young couple with a young baby came by and asked a question we get often, "Are those onions? Are they edible?" After hearing our description, they said they were turning their yard into a sustainable eco-system with only edible plants. We can say, "Yes, they are edible." (I recently pulled out a group of recipes for a presentation to our local club.) But my further explanations about beauty and ease of growing did not interest them.

Looking at the larger picture, I believe that daylilies, like all flowers, play a very important part in creating beauty in our world. I relate the diversity of color, shapes, sizes, and growing habits to the diversity of people - their shapes, size, life-styles and opinions. It is so great to have daylily friends who live in different places, have different favorite flowers, and represent such a diversity. Also, each time I dead head the daylilies, I am reminded of the cycles of life, death, and new life - the new birth of each bud, the beautiful bloom, the spent bloom, and the many seeds left behind to grow another day.

Social media has been around since the early 2000's, and undoubtedly, has changed the way the world receives and shares information. While there are many platforms from which to choose, over 3 billion people belong to Facebook, and half of those turn to it everyday for updates on friends and family as well as for information on the latest and the greatest.

Like many of you, I wasn't born into this world of technology. I just immigrated, and Facebook has become my go-to platform for keeping in touch with family and friends, some of which I have met through daylily events. As a frequent visitor to Facebook, my attention has been drawn to the amount of groups and pages associated with daylilies. There are hundreds to choose from, but I have found several managed by some of our own Region 11 members. These are worth a look!

Region 11 has its own Facebook group, "DAYLILIES Region 11 AHS American Hemerocallis Society, MO, KS, OK," which posts information regarding our region's many activities. Many of our Region 11 hybridizers have their own groups and websites as well. I have joined several groups over the last year which not only give out good information, but also allow people to buy and sell

daylilies, showcase promising seedlings and new introductions, and seek advice on everything daylilies. Here are a few of my favorites.

"Daylillies: One Stop Shop" is the creation of our own Bobby Scott. This group boasts nearly 6,000 members from all different regions and is packed full of information and entertainment. While Bobby features his own flowers regularly, others have also

posted lovely photos from their own gardens. Bobby often asks members to show off their own daylilies based on the topic of the moment, for example, watermarks. Other times, Bobby shares his most promising seedlings and invites others to do the same.

There are even times when he sells daylilies, which is how I obtained two more of Bobby's creations (I already had a few). You definitely do not need to be a hybridizer to enjoy this group. Give it a try!

If you haven't had the pleasure of visiting Nancy Rold's Glory Be Gardens, you are missing out. Nancy, whose program includes many miniature to small



crispate unusual forms as well as dark-colored scapes is gaining national attention. I was blessed to see the fruits of her labors during her open garden this past 4th of July, and I wasn't disappointed. On her Facebook page, simply titled "Glory Be Gardens," Nancy shares many of her introductions and promising seedlings which I was blessed to see last summer. She outlines her hybrdizing journey and plans for the future of her program. We are so fortunate that Nancy will be one of our speakers at the Region 11 Spring Fling next March. "Daylilies" is a group for anyone interested in daylilies. Its administrators include some of our own Region 11 hybridizers including Nancy Rold and Carol "Seajay" Mock. It is a very eclectic collection of posts from daylily lovers. Whether you are a hybridizer, or just an admirer like me, there is something for you in this group. Membership is by invitation only, but I guarantee you know someone who belongs to this group as it has over 11,000 members. This group doesn't sell any daylilies, but it allows members to ask questions, share photos and stories, and bounce ideas off of one another. Hybridizers are allowed to post links to their websites where you can browse their latest introductions. Have a question about growing daylilies? Post it, and you may receive hundreds of ideas. Members have a wealth of knowledge, and this group taps it each and every day.

Facebook can be a great tool, and I have just scratched the surface of the many offerings for us "daylily people." I strongly encourage you to browse and find groups and pages that fit your need. Winter is coming! There is no better time to scroll through Facebook and catch up with Region 11's best.

Spring Fling 2024

Spring Fling will take place the weekend of March 22 - 24, 2024 in Joplin, MO.

We will begin Friday evening with a presentation from Nancy Rold, Region 11 Hybridizer who is gaining national attention. Nancy is from the Central Missouri Daylily Club and lives in rural Boone County, MO. Her Daylily Garden is named Glory Be Daylily Garden.

Our special guest on Friday evening and on Saturday will be Dr. James (Gus) Guzinski. Gus has been very active with AHS for many years serving on the AHS Scientific Studies Committee. I have heard him speak at several national conventions and am impressed by his explanations of how daylilies actually grow and develop.

Guzinski has analyzed the two classes of pigments which create the broad range of color in daylilies. The program he will present to us is the result of 25 years of photographing all types of daylily flowers, foliage and clumps, to show the good but also the bad. His perspective is that daylilies can only be improved by

studying all daylily flowers and all parts of a daylily plant, including imperfections. Guzinski is sure to give us a unique approach to Hemerocallis.

Our other guest speaker is Michael Anders. Anders is a well-known hybridizer who has been sought after as a speaker and we were lucky enough to engage him for Spring Fling 2024.

Anders will present an in-depth history of the beginning of the tetraploid daylily movement and how a simple, rather nondescript, 1960 diploid introduction became the 'mother plant' of so many award-winning

tetraploid daylilies. Such is the background of Lavender Parade (Fay-Moldovan, 1960). Its genetics have been used by some of the most important hybridizers of today. We are still working on the timing of Anders' presentation into one or two parts, but it will definitely be on Saturday, March 23.

We will try something new with our Region 11 Hybridizers' Presentations. Since neither of our guests from outside of the Region have extensive hybridizing programs of their own (they both will donate a



Heidi and Charles Douglas' Hybridizing

The Flint Hills Daylily Society hosted a presentation with Heidi and Charles Douglas on August 6th at Pottoff Hall in Manhattan. Heidi and Charles were supposed to speak at our Winter Gathering in 2019, but Heidi had to cancel due to a family emergency. So it was great fun to have them finally in our region.

The Flint Hills club invited other regional clubs as well as other gardening groups in the Manhattan area. As a result, Heidi and Charles were able to present to about 60 people with AHS members coming from Oklahoma, Missouri and other clubs in Kansas as well as Master Gardeners and members of the Purple Thumbs from the K-State Gardens and the Town and Country Garden Club.

Charles and Heidi met at the Midwinter Gathering in Chattanooga, TN, in 2003. At that time, Heidi was using her small city lot in Cincinnati for her hybridizing whereas Charles had a large piece of land in South Carolina which had been in his family for several generations. They soon discovered that their relationship was more than interest in the genetics of daylilies and Heidi moved to South Carolina 2006.

Charles and Heidi married in 2007. They each have separate hybridizing programs with Heidi crossing diploids and Charles working with tetraploids.

According to Heidi, their biggest challenge in hybridizing is being able to breed for their climate not for people in other places.
Dormants are

going to be an issue with the changing climate. Winters are becoming warmer. Central regions where long periods of freezing temps were normal 30 years ago have become more moderate temperature-wise. Summers are hotter in South Carolina than they were in Ohio, but in general the climate is warming up across all regions and we will need to adjust accordingly.

On the other hand, Charles doesn't see any major challenges. "I'm happy with our cultivars," he said. "The face (bloom) is the easy part, the plant is the hard part." Charles explained that in year one they are looking for the pretty face, but in year 2 they look at the plant as a whole and in year three they look at bud count and branching.

When questioned about what they see as unique in breeding programs, Charles responded that "all hybridizers have their own goals," while some are still hybridizing for blue, or diploids with edges, while others are working on clean color.

"Color changers are interest to some people," said Heidi, "but to me they are melting." By late afternoon often the bloom is spent. "What is fun about the national is that everyone has their own thing and this gives every hybridizer the chance to get their crosses known."

"The internet allows back yard hybridizers to get known quickly and to become successful," said Charles. "It is a different world than what it used to be."

Together they are both working on improving reblooming in their cultivars. "If it doesn't rebloom, it doesn't stay," commented Charles. "We evaluate our introductions based on their reblooming abilities."

When asked what is their greatest joy about hybridizing, Heidi responded that was "seeing the new blooms. We do this to make us happy." At this point hybridizing is more a hobby for Charles but for Heidi it still a job. Heidi said she hybridizes for distinction; "I want my plants to not need a tag" to be recognized. Cultivars like Mr and Mrs Bubbs or the Mayor of Browns Ferry you can recognize from across the garden.

What still needs to be done in hybridizing? In Charles' opinion there is a lot of advancement that could be done in pink daylilies... like Barbie in Pink (Petit, 2005). Charles went on to quote Patrick Stamile who once said "you find a lot of pretty flowers along the way" but not all of them are going to be introductions.

Who got you into daylilies?

It All Started with a Gilbert Wild Catalog

Bill and I built our home on 40 wooded acres in 1992. We cut out 3-4 acres around the house and I started laying out garden areas. My boss had given me a Gilbert Wild catalog and said to plant daylilies as they were low maintenance.

The first order in 1993 was a dozen pink and peach daylilies. Deciding this was boring, I added a dozen red and purple. The next year I met a member of the MoKan daylily club on a Kansas Wildflower Society walk. Bettye Coughenour invited me to the MoKan club show and follow-up sale. When Bettye divided her clumps, she would give me dozens of her plants. I would come home from the MoKan sales with a grocery bag filled with a little of everything. When I reached 300 my boss said, "that's not exactly what I was thinking!"

The Mokan club had three Bettys and they all helped my quest for more daylilies. The large hybridizers sent out wonderful color catalogs in those days and I bought from all over the country. The "Florida Mecca" monopolized daylilies for many years with their advancements in bud count, branching, eyes and "chicken fat" edges and picotees...and more! I visited

Ladybug and Daylily World in Sanford one year. Unfortunately, I was buying a lot of Florida evergreen daylilies and after a few years they dwindled down to unattractive plants. My daughter was living in Florida at that time, so I sent her over 100 evergreens, and they loved being back home.

There have been many learning opportunities over the years in addition to staying away from tender evergreens.

My garden was to be on the 2012 region 11 tour sponsored by the MoKan club. In the fall of 2010, I decided to divide and reset a couple of beds. I could not find help and it was the beginning of October when I finished. I had about 200 daylilies "freeze dry" and totally disappear. Fortunately, my mentor Betty C came through with lots of replacements.

I have been active in the MoKan club since 1994 and I have worked with Region 11 as treasurer, director for six

years, Lily Auction chair, new member liaison and Winter Gathering/Spring Fling manager. I am presently the AHS director for Region 7 (California/Nevada/Hawaii/Arizona) as they have no volunteer for the position. I have been chair of AHS publications for 9 of the last 10 years. During that time we have published the new Illustrated Guide, Double Daylilies, Small and Miniature Daylilies, The Open Form (Spiders & UF's), Hybridizing 101 and the 75th anniversary series. I have been attending the national conventions since 2012 and enjoy visiting the beautiful gardens throughout the country.

Since the late 1990's I have opened my garden on the 4th of July for tours. The only public garden with daylilies is 60 miles from Louisburg so I have welcomed visitors to see the wonderful colors and shapes and sizes that exist beyond the orange daylily that they all know about. A few have become MoKan and AHS members after seeing the great variety available.

It has been a fun adventure and I still don't have a "favorite" daylily. I have downsized from 900 to 600 varieties and the current drought might just cull a few more. It has been a wonderful journey meeting so many daylily gardeners throughout the region and country.

Tucked at the back of the daylily bed that Karen Berry Bouman graciously lets me use in St. Peters, Missouri, it starts blooming in mid-July, has a green throat that shows even on the back of the flower and is very fragrant. Its statistics are also worth noting: 5.5 inch flower, 33 inches tall, 4-way branching, 38 buds.

Topguns Twisted Sunset was one of my best daylilies this year, and in fact has historically been a top performer in my garden. This photo was taken 21 June 2023 when the first blooms opened and it continued to bloom over the next several weeks. I'm presently doing fall garden cleanup and I just removed 29 scapes from the plant, and as you see in the photo there are at least 6 to 8 blooms per scape, so we enjoyed literally hundreds of blooms from this plant.

Well, choosing from a rather limited number of daylilies that bloomed before the deer decided they tasted great even when sprayed with Deer Stopper, Liquid Fence, Bobbex, hot sauce, Downy fabric softener and dish soap, my best performer was probably Nate Bremer's Public Display of Affection. It has made a nice clump, with lots of scapes and good bloom.

One of my favorite plants this past summer was Jamie Gossard's 'Heavenly New Frontiers'. Touted as one of the first known pentaploid cultivars, I got it originally out of curiosity and to play with it in hybridization. Over the past couple of years, however, as the single fan I bought grew into two then three enormous fans, it became a plant that was hard to miss. This year it was my favorite of the mid-lates to bloom. It is registered with a 10" bloom, on 27" tall scapes, which is pretty much spot on to what I see in my garden. The nicest scape this year was like a tree trunk compared to its height, almost 1" in diameter, and it had the exact branching and bud count as its registration (4 branches and 24 buds). What I enjoy most is its bloom pace; each scape blooms out no more than 1 or 2 blossoms a day, making for a nice 2-3 bloom display almost every day from the first week of July through the third week of August. And with such large blooms, 2 or 3 is plenty. All that, and it performed that well in a nasty drought year for us in central Missouri, with very little rain from April through mid-July. It does need dead-heading to prevent spent blooms from covering the remaining buds, but I find that to be a curse for many of the larger, wider-pedaled cultivars.

However, after the past three seasons, I found myself voting for it for Award of Merit. I haven't made much seed out of it yet- thanks to two straight dry summers - but I'll give it another go next summer, and hopefully it's even better than it was this year
